Alex Webb and Rebecca Norris Webb Bring Signature Collaborative Style to Boston with Two Exhibitions



Memory City Alex Webb & Rebecca Norris Webb Robert Klein Gallery 38 Newbury St September 27 – October 31

BOSTON, MA – Photographers Alex Webb and Rebecca Norris Webb bring their signature "two looks" to Boston this fall with two distinct exhibitions of work. The husband and wife team's most recent collaboration, *Memory City*, a yearlong photographic study of Rochester, New York, Eastman Kodak Company's hometown, will be shown at Robert Klein Gallery (38 Newbury St) from Saturday, September 27, through Friday, October 31. The show opens with a reception, artists' talk, and book signing on September 27 from 2 to 5 PM.

Slant Rhymes, a selection of Webb and Norris Webb's images from past projects paired together for their visual similarities, will be on display at the gallery's satellite space, Robert Klein Gallery @ Ars Libri (500 Harrison Ave), from Friday, October 3, through Friday, October 31. The show opens during October's SoWa First Friday from 5:30 to 7:30 PM on Friday, October 3.

Webb and Norris Webb took five trips to Rochester, New York, from April 2012 to April 2013 following Kodak's declaration of bankruptcy in January 2012. The resulting photographs, compiled in *Memory City* (Radius Books, 2014), have been heralded as "both melancholy and charming" (*New Statesman*) and a "recognition of embodied looking" (*Fraction Magazine*).

In the booklet *Notes on Film and Memory* that accompanies *Memory City*, Norris Webb muses: "Is it the waiting I'll miss most of all? Film insists on this: time becomes a collaborator." Norris Webb used color film for all her pictures in the book. Webb, on the other hand, used Kodachrome, a positive color slide film he "used almost exclusively for more than 30 years" and which can now only be processed to make black and white

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negatives. For his color images interspersed throughout the series, Webb used a digital camera. The pair's thoughtful use of the medium – and the implications that each choice has and has had on the notion of photography itself – runs the course of the series and gives it an unmistakable sense of urgency.

This is Webb and Norris Webb's second exhibition together at Robert Klein Gallery; their first, *Violet Isle*, took place in 2011 in conjunction with their eponymous show at Museum of Fine Arts, Boston. Norris Webb's personal project, *My Dakota*, was shown at Robert Klein Gallery @ Ars Libri in 2012.

Originally a poet, **REBECCA NORRIS WEBB** has published three photography books that explore the complicated relationship between people and the natural world — *The Glass Between Us, Violet Isle: A Duet of Photographs from Cuba* (with Alex Webb), and *My Dakota*, which interweaves her text and photographs from her home state of South Dakota. *My Dakota* was selected as one of best photography books of 2012 by *PDN, Photo-Eye*, and *Time*. Born in Rushville, Indiana, Norris Webb graduated from Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism in 1989.

ALEX WEBB, born in San Francisco and a Harvard University alumnus, is a street photographer whose unique vision spans four decades. Webb joined the international photographers' cooperative Magnum Photos as an associate member in 1976. Webb has earned a name for himself by publishing work in several international publications, including *National Geographic, The New York Times Magazine*, and *Life Magazine*. His work is in the collections of Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; and Museum of Fine Arts, Houston.
